She is also an advertising creative director who specializes in designing for California cultural and nature publications, exhibits, public spaces, and magazines. Tima is a member of the California Indian Basketweavers' Association and is featured in the book *California Indian Baskets: San Diego to Santa Barbara and Beyond to the San Joaquin Valley. received the **2012 Best in Show** at the Autry American Arts Marketplace for her basketry, the First People's Fund **2017 Community Spirit Award** for her years as a cultural educator, and an **Emmy** for her work on the KCET series *Tending the Wild*.

L. Frank Manriquez is a Two-Spirit Tongva/Ajachmem/Rarámuri descent, tribal scholar, cartoonist, language advocate, and active decolonizationist. As a culture keeper, she co-founded the Advocates for Indigenous California Language Survival to combat erasure and previously served on the California Indian Basket Weavers Association and the Cultural Conservancy board. Her art has been featured worldwide in museums and art galleries— and in 2021 as part of Cara Romero's Tongvaland campaign.

As a current Tribal Senator for his tribe, Mark collaborates with Federal, State and local municipalities, as well as other sovereign nations, in efforts to better his tribe. To better accomplish financial, political, or cultural objectives for his tribal community, he graduated with a B.S. Business Administration with a focus in Global Supply Chain Management from California State University, Northridge. Since 2010, he has worked for the United States Census, Tribal

non-profits, and Tribal Governments in various capacities.
